NSW young people in out-of-home care are at risk of homelessness at their 18th birthday. Many are trying to complete their education at the same time and find it difficult to juggle the realities of having to leave their current placements or residential homes whilst focussing on finishing their studies.

NSW young people remain the only cohort of young people in the country that do not have adequate support to 21 as other states and territories now have.

CREATE Foundation urges the Perrottet Government to listen to, and try to understand the issues that young care leavers face, and support young people till they reach the age of 21, regardless of if they are in foster, kinship or residential care.


We need your help!

An indicator of urgent change needed is in excess of 16,160 children and oung people did not sleep in their own home last night and are urrently growing up in out-of-home care. Quote 1

"Young people should have the option to stay in care until they're 21 so it makes it easier for them to finish year 12, find a job, and learn life skills of budgeting and independent living." (clubCREATE member)

Quote 2

"Please, I need the support to go on after 18, so I can stay with my carer. I need to be looked after like other kids my age. I missed out on being cared for by my parents properly, and need to be cared for now. My life will be better forever if I can stay longer with my carer. I will need direction and boundaries after 18." (Male, 15)

Quote 3

"Turning 18 and my money stops and everything changes is worrying to me. I feel I am not ready to take on new challenges yet. Turning 18, I would still be in school doing my HSC... My carer I can talk to, but I still have the worry about everything changing and it is too much that everything will stop or change when I turn 18. Staying with a carer until 21 would be good. I will have time to explore my options with further time and give me more flexibility to choose further study or work." (Male, 17)

"My carer is like my mum. She looks after me. I need looking after. I missed being looked after when I was little. I need to be able to have a safe place like my friends will, indefinitely." (Male, 15)
